

Webmaster's Corner for February, 2003

Always On

In my December, 2002 column I discussed the various types of Internet connections in the context of "speed", or "bandwidth". This month I want to emphasize one very advantageous feature of the broadband or "high speed" Internet connections. These services, like Cable or DSL, are "always on" (or effectively so). By this I mean you don't have to go through the annoying steps of dialing up to go on-line.

If you have only a dial-up Internet service, you must first determine if the phone line is free or are you or anyone else likely to need the phone during the anticipated length of time you will be on-line. This step is unnecessary if you have a phone line dedicated to your Internet service. After you get the free phone line (assuming you are still in the mood), you must them make the phone call to your ISP to "connect" before you can do what you wanted to do on-line such as visit a web site or send/receive email. The line doesn't always connect properly the first time due to a variety of causes so it may take a few minutes before everything is ready.

Once you have a connection, it will occasionally drop off during your session

(such as during a period of inactivity) and you will have to start the process all over again. With the always on connections, you just sit down at your computer and "do it"! This assumes that one of the other family members is not already on. That is a different problem and could be the subject of a future column – the home network for sharing an Internet connection between multiple computers. This "always on" condition also assumes you leave your computer turned on, a procedure I highly recommend since the turning on and turning off process causes the most "wear and tear" on your hardware. They don't use that much power - go ahead and leave it on - your computer will last longer. During long period of inactivity you can turn off the monitor since it is the highest energy user.

If I have confused you about anything I have said here or if you want to know more, send an email to webmas-ter@quilt.to and I'll see if another column on the subject is called for or perhaps an individual response. I am also still seeking appropriate subjects for future columns.




