

January 11, 2021 Meeting



This month our guest will be **Timna Tar**, who will give her virtual presentation, "Before and After: Repeating Patterns." In her lecture she shows how much of her work is inspired by antique and family quilts. We'll see the contemporary quilts she now creates the utilitarian quilts from her life which planted the seeds that grew into the contemporary works she now creates. Timna is a designer for Studio e Fabrics and is a popular teacher and speaker. She comes from a long line of quilters but did not begin quilting until after studying art history in college. She bought her first longarm machine in 2001 and began quilting for clients shortly thereafter. Timna's own nationally award-winning quilts are in private and corporate collections and have been seen in numerous exhibits, books and magazines, including Modern Patchwork Magazine, American Quilter Magazine, Machine Quilting Unlimited and Quiltmania Magazine (to name a few!) She has been a guest on The Quilt Show and Quilting Arts TV and can be heard on The Crafty Planner podcast.

February 8, 2021







Our speaker this month will be Jane Haworth, who will give her virtual lecture "Living A Creature Life." She is a British-born quilt artist and teacher living in Auburn, California. Jane went to college in Carlisle, England and studied Textile Design majoring in weaving. Her first real job was working for Laura Ashley, where she became proficient and fast on the sewing machine.

The technique Jane uses for most of her quilts is raw-edge collage appliqué which she has been doing for over 15 years. This allows her to cut, layer and then glue the fabrics before machine quilting them. Influences for her quilts come from many places, including photos of landscapes, sea-life, birds and the work of illustrator Charley Harper. Her most recent works featuring pet portraits have been featured on Quilting Arts TV and in Quilting Arts magazine and used as the cover art.

The guild will host a three-hour virtual workshop, Rocking Roosters Fabric Collage with Jane on Saturday February 13 at 9:30 am. The cost is \$35 for members and \$45 for non- members. Sign up by visiting our website and submitting a registration form.

Materials List for Chickens Class

Jane Haworth

PDF pattern printed out and taped together.

Variety of fabrics highly patterned, in rich colors, black and white, or reds. Chickens do not need to be realistic. Pieces can be small or scraps. Maybe look at rooster/chicken photos for color inspiration.

18 x 18" piece of Pellon Easy Pattern or similar interfacing you can see through.

Scissors, sharp and good for cutting small pieces of fabric. I like Karen Kay Buckley, blue 6" scissors.

Chalk marking tool or similar, disappearing pen, and pencil. I like the Bonin Chalk Pencil

Fine Sharpie for tracing pattern

Fabric glue, I use Allenes Tacky Glue or Roxannes Basting glue

Tool for applying glue like a toothpick

Optional: tweezers and light box.

To finish: you will need a background piece approx 18" x 18". You could piece this as I did in my samples.

Sewing machine with straight and free motion foot

Fabric piece 18" x 18" for backing and batting.

Neutral thread of piecing and colored threads to blend or contrast with fabrics.

It was suggested to put non-holiday backing fabric so that the placemats would be appropriate for use at other times of the year.
